#### 2019 Conference

#### October 6, 2019 University of Maryland College Park, MD Department of Music

We had an informative and educational afternoon with Monica Dale and Marjorie Lee, sharing their knowledge of music in Masterclasses and programs. A truly wonderful afternoon of sharing and gaining knowledge!!!

Monica Dale started our conference, presenting a program on MusiKinesis, a contemporary American approach to teaching and learning music through movement.

During the session we learned the philosophy of MusiKinesis emphasizing aural and kinesthetic experience before abstract notation. Exercises integrate ear, mind and body in a process designed to develop musicianship from the inside out.

This session introduced practical techniques and strategies teachers can use within group, private and semi-private music lessons. We had fun playing with concepts including simple and compound meters, rhythmic patterns and polyrhythm with examples from piano literature. Skills addressed included internalization of tempo and duration, aural perception, coordination, and rhythm reading. It was a very hands-on approach with audience participation. A great deal of fun for all.



#### GERTRUDE S. BROWN MEMORIAL CONCERTO COMPETITION

2019-2020 Gertrude S. Brown Memorial Concerto Competition was held at UMBC in Catonsville, MD on Sunday January 12, 2020 with a total of 155 entries from 27 teachers. All participants and award winners (24 Winners, 24 Alternates and 42 Honorable Mentions as shown on MSMTA website) deserve hearty congratulations. I want to express my sincere appreciation for the judges, accompanists and teachers - without their dedicated help the event would not have been as successful. Special thanks go to Dr. Junko Takahashi, MSMTA President and Dr. Bok Hwa Kim for their help throughout the competition. Our appreciation also goes to UMBC for allowing us to hold the event on their facilities.

Winners of the competition had opportunity to perform their winning piece as soloists with New England Youth Ensemble of Washington Adventist University (Dr. Preston Hawes and Dr. Brian Liu, coconductors) on February 2nd at Peters Music Center of Washington Adventist University in Takoma Park. 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#### **STUDENT ACTIVITIES**

#### **KEYBOARD MUSICIANSHIP PROGRAM**

Approximately 830 students have taken the Keyboard Musicianship Test so far this year, and we still have one more center to go! Thank you to everyone who has made this year run so smoothly!

For instructions on submitting a student's nomination for honors trophy, teachers must log into the <u>msmta.org</u> website, go to "Student Calendar" and scroll down to "Keyboard Musicianship Exam." Click on the link for "Award Nomination" for NEW instructions for submitting awards. There are two deadlines left this year: March 1st and May 1st. Trophies will be sent to the teachers within three weeks of the deadline.

The big news is the forthcoming **2020 Keyboard Musicianship Program Syllabus**, the first update in 25 years! Teachers can look for it to be released in mid-March and it will be used for the Fall 2020 testing. It will be posted on the MSMTA website in the "Members only" section. Here are some highlights to look forward to:

- The syllabus is extended to Level 12. Levels 1 through 12 will be adjudicated at the state level. The Preparatory Level will be administered by the teacher, in-studio or in coordination with other local teachers, at any time of the teacher's choosing. (No DMA points given for Preparatory Level.)
- Both Scales and Arpeggios modules will be required at the same level for all students.
- Modules will be organized by level, to help teachers see how they relate.
- Rather than cumulative keys, Levels 1 through 6 will be more focused on a limited number of keys for students to prepare for the test.
- Blocked Chords and Arpeggios are grouped together for students to see the connection in what they are playing.
- For each module, the increase in difficulty from level to level is designed to be a natural progression.
- A new part of the Scales module is called "Chord Knowledge," in which students will be asked to show their understanding of their skills.
- All Transposition modules will be prepared, and the pieces given in the syllabus are required at the given level.
- A "Rhythmic Reading" test will be given before the sight-reading test, in which part of the sight-reading is to be tapped while counting out loud.
- A new "Lead Sheet Harmonization" module is an option for students (and teachers) interested in learning modern styles of playing with lead sheets. (Students will choose to do either the Traditional Harmonization as in the current syllabus, or the Lead Sheet Harmonization.)
- Suggestions for teaching the Harmonization modules will be given.
- Resources for students will be suggested.

Our committee has worked hard to make the 2020 edition intuitive and as easy to understand as possible for teachers and students. The scale levels are close enough to the current 1995 edition that students should be able to easily move up to the next level next year.

Many, many thanks to those who helped with this project over the past few years: Joanna Greenwood, Ann McCandliss, Svetlana Volkova, Edwina Hunter, Lori McCarthy, Junko Takahashi, and Connie Fischel, as well as others who've given suggestions and guidance! We are looking forward to many more students using this innovative and exciting program!

#### THE STRINGS PLUS FESTIVAL

The Strings Plus Festival is a chamber music competition for string students (ages 7-18). All combinations of string groups, including strings with non-stringed instruments, are eligible to apply. Piano trios, string quartets, strings ensembles with wind players, and other groups are welcome to participate as long as the group includes a string instrument. All participants receive comments, and winners are awarded a certificate and ribbon. Strings Plus Festival will be held on **Sunday April 19, 2020** from 9-12 at the Landon School. **The application deadline is Monday March 9, 2020**. 

We love you, Judy!



New Look for MCMTA Newsletter - With the arrival of the new year, our newsletter has a new look, created by our new VP for Publications, Marc Donnelly. Marc has outstanding credentials as a piano and voice teacher,



## GREATER COLUMBIA MUSIC TEACHERS ASSOCIATION

Greater Columbia Music Teachers Association has had several lovely events so far this year beginning with a Piano Master Class featuring clinician Dr. Joseph Satava on Saturday, November 16, 2019. The class, open to all prepared students at level Late Elementary and above, featured five performers.

December 8th brought the first of our three annual Outreach Recitals. This particular recital was held at Morningside House in Ellicott City. These recitals bring together students, family members and teachers with a senior community. The programs include a wide range of solo and ensemble literature. While most performers are pianists, vocal, string, brass and woodwind solo and ensembles are also welcome. Our second Outreach Recital will be held on February 9th at Vantage House in Columbia. This particular recital is limited to intermediate level students and above.

January 25th, 2020 was a delightful day, featuring two of our annual festivals, Family and Friends and Music Tells the Story. Our Family and Friends Recital is a wonderful opportunity to perform ensemble and chamber music with friends and/or family members. Many combinations are possible, limited only by the imagination. Instrumentalists, vocalists, parents performing with their children all combine to make for a very enjoyable event! Music Tells the Story is our theme recital for students of all ages, abilities, and instruments. Students entering write a story about their piece in one paragraph. The stories are included on the program for the audience to enjoy and the students benefit from writing a personal and engaging tale about their music. We were treated to three recitals ... one Family & Friends Recital and two Music Tells the Story recitals.

February 22nd will feature our Judged Recitals, a noncompetitive event in which students play a minimum of 2 minutes of memorized music. A carefully selected judge from outside the association listens, writes comments, and assigns a rating which can be applied toward Gold Cup points. Literature requirements are the same as in other GCMTA events. Emphasis is, as always, on a polished, stylistic performance and encouragement for the performer.
